

## **Faith@Home**

Commit yourself to spending time with GOD and His Word on at least five days this week. Read the Bible passage(s) listed.

Ask GOD for understanding. Reflect on the verses you read and write down your answers to the question(s). Pray that GOD will guide you to walk in His Word.

### **Day One**

Read Psalm 63

1. Can you/do you call the GOD of the universe “My GOD”?
2. What do you think it would look like to seek Him like someone dying of thirst would seek water?
3. Ask GOD what you need to do to get to that point in your relationship with Him. Ask Him for His help. Then, go after it.

### **Day Two**

Read Psalm 63

1. Which verse(s) stand out to you in this Psalm? Take some time to mediate on that verse. What does it say to you?
2. When you are in times of difficulty, do you take time to remember times when you experienced GOD’s presence and blessing in the past? How does that help?
3. What does it mean to you to “cling” to Him? How will you do that this week? Does it help to know that His “right hand upholds you”?

### **Day Three**

Read Jeremiah 29:11-13

1. What do you think it means to “seek GOD with all your heart?”
2. Do you know that GOD is always pursuing you more than you pursue Him. Think back over your life. Can you think of times when you can see that GOD was trying to get your attention or calling out to you to turn to Him?
3. How will you seek GOD today?

### **Day Four**

Read Jeremiah 2:13

1. Cisterns are holes in the ground made to collect water. Often they become broken down, dirty, and unsanitary. How are the “GOD-substitutes” of our culture like broken cisterns?
2. How is Jesus the “spring of living water?” (see also John 7:37-38)
3. As you live your life each day, which one are you turning to quench your thirst - “broken cisterns” or the “spring of living water?”

### **Day Five**

Read Psalm 26

1. List the things for which David pleads with GOD in this Psalm.
2. On what basis does he make these requests? In other words, what does he claim to be true?
3. Pray for GOD to bring revival through our worship gathering.
